#### Classrooms

#### Ladybird class

This half term in Ladybirds our core story is "We're Going on a Bear Hunt" by Michael Rosen. The children are really engaging with the story and are beginning to retell it independently. We have been supporting this through physical activities such as a Bear Hunt assault course, creative activities such as Swishy swishy grass painting and bear masks, and imaginative activities such as a bear hunt small world tray. Once again, this half term we are promoting independence by encouraging the children to try and put on their own coats and pulling on their wellies or shoes. Thank you to the parents supporting us by doing this at home, as it is really supporting the children's confidence in this area. This term our Woodland Day is going to be Tuesday and Woodland Julie has been visiting our class to get to know the children. They have enjoyed exploring the Woodland garden in small groups and making cheerio bird feeders for bird watching week.

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Finally, the Ladybird team would like to thank our parents for continuing to support us throughout the year, we really appreciate it.

#### **Butterfly class**

We are reading a traditional tale 'The Gingerbread Man' as our core story for this half term. The children are really enjoying hearing and joining in with this story. We have chosen one version as there are several different stories and we will be hearing many of them. We will talk about what is the same and different with each one. The children are exploring some new words in this story including bakery, thistles, dizzy and milk churns. We will look at ginger, try a ginger biscuit and attempt to make/bake our own gingerbread people. The children are starting to help with retelling of the story and asking questions or making comments about it. We have collected small world characters, made stick puppets and masks to allow the children to use them for retelling or making up their own stories. Also props have been added to the home corner including mixing bowl, wooden spoon, cardboard gingerbread men and old packets of ingredients so the children can pretend to mix their own. The children are enjoying making gingerbread people using brown play dough and cutters with beads to decorate them. We will be practicing mixing brown paint so we can have a go at painting gingerbread people before decorating them.

Our Woodland Day this term is Wednesday. Last term the children really enjoyed working with Woodland Julie and exploring the Woodland garden as well as learning new skills. This term we will be doing activities including bird watching, making bird seed cake, playing with mud, digging and retelling our story 'The Gingerbread Man'. We have been continuing singing lots of songs and rhymes some which are familiar to the children as well as some new ones! The children love singing and joining in with some of the actions.

#### **Buzzy Bee class**

This half term we are reading many versions of the Three Billy Goats Gruff. The story really has embraced the children's imagination, and we have lots of role play happening both in the classroom and the nursery garden. Children are using props to retell the story, either by themselves, or within a group. The children have been distinguishing their voice for the different characters as they re enact the story, showing a good awareness of expression, and the different characters. We have looked at all different types of Trolls and Ogres, discussing whether they are friendly or not, looking at different and similar features of the various trolls we have found from stories, tv and film.

We will be taking part in bird watching week, with lots of activities around making binoculars, looking after the birds in our gardens, and identifying the birds we see fly over and around Caverstede. We will also be celebrating Chinese New Year, with a wide variety of activities and experiences, from noodle bar in the garden, to creating a large 3D Dragon. We will be reading and listening to the story of the how each year was named after an animal. Our Woodland day is now on a Thursday and the children have been having a wonderful time, digging for worms, and much more. Have you thought about becoming a Parent Governor at our school?

# A parent's guide to .....



# Mathematics - Part 1



Counting is a key skill for young children to learn, and there is much that you can do at home to help your child grasp some of the mathematical ideas that they will use for the rest of their lives. The Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage 2014, states :

**'Mathematics** involves providing children with opportunities to develop and improve their skills in counting, understanding and using numbers, calculating simple addition and subtraction problems; and to describe shapes, spaces, and measures. '

Within the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum, Mathematics is sub divided into the following specific areas of learning and development:

- Numbers
- Shape, space and measures

# Supporting maths at home

Here are some suggestions of activities that you can do with your child at home to develop their early mathematical skills.

### **Routines:**

Use routine times such as bedtime and bath time to develop mathematical ideas. For example,

- Count the buttons on shirts or blouses as you fasten or unfasten them on your child's clothes.
- Count the number of Velcro straps on your child's shoes as they put them on and take them off.
- Compare the size and shape of different containers in the bath and the heaviness of containers when filled with water.
- Use tidy up time to sort items e.g. 'put the trains in the green tub, put the cars in the red box.'

# Mealtimes:

Encourage your child to help prepare meals. For example, let them:

- Help you weigh ingredients.
- Find the best size of pot for cooking potatoes.
- Ensure that everyone has a knife, fork and spoon or cup and plate.

### Outdoors:

Look out for ways to talk about mathematics when you are outdoors, such as going to the park or to the supermarket. For example,

- Draw their attention to numbers and shapes in shops, on packaging, on houses, or on road signs and buses.
- Count trees, cars or recycling bins.

# Other activities:

- Play board games with your child .
- If your child goes upstairs count the steps together.
