This term will see us explore different celebrations such as Mother's Day, World Book Day, Easter and Pancake day, we have also had a visit from a real author/illustrator Ellie Sandall, which was an amazing day!

Butterflies

Our core story this term is not one but several reads, these are the works of Nick Sharratt and his amazing line of Shark in the Park story books, this also includes Shark in the Dark and Shark in the Park on a windy Day. We will learn about sharks and explore their underwater world to see what we can discover about these amazing creatures. We will bring these ideas to our role play and small world work and will be searching for sharks outside! Inspired from the stories we will also explore telescopes mainly to see what we can find around us when focused on one area.

We have lots planned for our time in the Woodland Garden too with shape and shark hunting and also trying more activities around the fire circle, which the children really appear to enjoy. We continue to develop our skills around number, reading, storytelling and mark making as well as the other areas of the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS). We will also explore the works of Andy Goldsworthy who creates artwork using natural materials such as leaves, sticks and stones and see how this can influence our creative sides.

Ladybirds

This half term in Ladybird class we are looking and reading the story 'The Very Busy Spider' by Eric Carle. The children are beginning to recognise the animals we find in the story and they are joining in with making the animal noises. We have been finding out about spiders and how they make a web. The children have been singing the songs 'Old MacDonald' and 'Incy Wincy Spider'. We have started making a display about spiders and the children have been printing, drawing as well as weaving a big web. We have been singing lots of number songs and rhymes as well as looking at different patterns and shapes.

Our Woodland Day this term is Tuesday. The children are getting really confident at putting on a wetsuit and their wellies. The children enjoy playing in the mud kitchen, in the digging pod, looking for spiders and webs, playing with water, using the wheel barrows and playing on the tyre swing and much more!

Buzzy Bees

This term we are looking at the story Chicken Licken. We have several copies of this in the classroom, with different endings, and different characters. This will help promote looking at how stories end, and provide the children opportunities to make their own ending to this story. We have dressing up clothes and other props to help the children re-enact the story. The children will have opportunities to explore the story and in the small world play too. Alongside Chicken Licken we shall also be reading other stories such as Rosie's Walk, and Little Red Hen. These stories will link well with spring, learning all about the different animals.

Our Woodland day continues on a Thursday until Easter, but will change after Easter— so keep an eye out for the change of day.

In the classrooms, **each child has their own pigeonhole for information**, letters etc. so please remember to check these every day that your child attends nursery as there may be something important in there for you.

Child Protection and Safeguarding for Schools

We take child protection issues extremely seriously; at all times we consider the protection and safety of the child in our care. Child protection issues are always dealt with in the appropriate ways. All staff have attended child protection training and are familiar with the correct procedures.

At Caverstede Nursery School we follow the Child Protection procedures for the Peterborough Safeguarding Board.

"It may be helpful for you to know that the law (Children Act 1989) requires all school staff to pass on information which gives rise to a concern about a child's welfare, including risk from non-accidental injury, neglect, emotional or sexual abuse. Schools are encouraged to take the attitude that where there are grounds for concern they should be over-cautious, and seek advice, rather than to risk a child's safety. Occasionally, this duty on staff means that a concern is passed on which is later shown to be unfounded. It is hoped that parents/carers will appreciate how difficult it is for schools to carry out this delicate responsibility, and accept that the staff member was acting in good faith and in the best interests of all children."

We have named people for child protection they are Debbie Hayes, Katy Coles and Emily Wiseman.

If you have concerns regarding children's safety and protection, it is essential that you contact your child's key person, class teacher or the Headteacher.

Mathematics – Part 2




Rhymes and stories

Read and recite rhymes and stories with mathematical content to your children, because this will:

- Stimulate your child's imagination and help them to be able to understand mathematical concepts.
- Help them to understand difficult concepts such as time or comparing size or quantity.
- Help them to become aware of counting, without really thinking about it, and increase their sense of rhythm.
- Help them to become aware of number names and other mathematical ideas, such as sequence (order) and speed.
